

# **Got Plants? Watch Out!**

akland's Blight Ordinance was enacted during the administration of Mayor Elihu Harris. Most community activists supported it, hoping glaring and intractable blight could be corrected: vacant lots or front yards with dead cars and refrigerators, illegal dumping, empty and deteriorating buildings. But, as the cliché goes, be careful what you wish for. Your prized landscaping, important for screening, aesthetics, and habitat has also come to be defined as blight. Because of the extraordinary powers of the City to collect heavy fines and fees on seemingly open-ended blight investigations, the ordinance has been redefined.

But most Oakland residents no doubt assume the ordinance, enforced by the Community and Economic Development Agency's (CEDA) Building Services Department, is targeting major offenders. Most would be unaware that a repeat offense within an arbitrary two-year period results in a fine of over \$1,300. And, standards are imposed so loosely that two different inspectors can have radically different takes on the same property.

When what Alfred Crofts and I believed to be an attractively landscaped yard on a rental property we have owned for 10 years motivated an angry neighbor to make a complaint, we learned what every Oakland home and apartment owner/renter with a garden should watch for.

# Differing Right of Way Requirements

We were cited with "Overgrown vegetation, overgrowth obstructing public right of way." We learned that could mean different things at different times. One inspector wants 36 inches clearance on the sidewalk. CEDA employee Lee White, handling "engineer-

# Getting Close! College Avenue Safeway EIR Matching Grant Fundraising Drive Makes Gains

RCPC is getting closer to reaching its \$10,000 goal for the matching grant from

the Rose Foundation for Communities and the Environment. The grant (and matching donations) will fund professional consultants to review and critique the environmental impact report for the College Avenue Safeway Shopping Center Project. As of November 24, RCPC had received donations totaling \$7,500. The RCPC board will next focus on talking to College Avenue merchants about supporting this community effort.

The draft environmental impact report (EIR) is likely to be released in December or January, so we're scrambling to reach our

goal and bring in a full slate of consultants for the draft EIR's 45-day public review and comment period. # ■ Rockridge Shopping Center Reconstruction Project (Broadway and Pleasant Valley)

The Planning Commission's design review committee will hold a public hearing December 8, 5 p.m., at City Hall, Hearing Room 1, to review this project, which will reconstruct and expand North Oakland's most important shopping center.

RCPC is working with four other local

community groups to present an alternative community proposal.

- In Rockridge; Friends and Neighbors of College Avenue (FANS)
- In Temescal; Standing Together for Accountable Neighborhood Development (STAND) and Urbanists for a Livable Temescal Rockridge Area (ULTRA)
- In the Piedmont Avenue Area, the Piedmont Avenue Neighborhood Improvement League (PANIL).

Working together, the groups are designing a proposal to meet Safeway's project phasing requirements while providing a shopping area that is better integrated into North Oakland's urban fabric. When complete, the design will be posted on RCPC's website: http://rockridge.org.

Community support at the public hearing will be important in getting the Planning Commission to take the community alternative plan seriously. An environmental impact report (EIR) currently in preparation

may be released this spring.

#### ■ Citywide Zoning Update

The Planning Commission continues its review of the proposed citywide zoning revisions with a public hearing on commercial area zoning changes scheduled December 15, 7 p.m., at City Hall, Hearing Room 1.

While the current rezoning proposal for the most part respects Rockridge's successful commercial zoning, RCPC continues to push for "fine tuning" to eliminate some problematic aspects.

RCPC is particularly concerned about the way conditional use permits for ground floor non-retail uses have nibbled away at College Avenue's retail base.

If you can attend the public hearing, your support for strengthening College Avenue's retail zoning would be most welcome and important for the commission to note.

Caldecott Tunnel 4th Bore project now under construction. The proposed project list was developed by the city based mostly on a 2008 agreement between Oakland and Caltrans settling Oakland's objections to adding the fourth bore, and also on a series of walk audits of the area that took place last summer.

Speaking to a full room at Kaiser Elementary School at the November 8 meeting, planning consultant Victoria Eisen presented 33 draft mitigation projects. The projects are divided between North Hills areas nearest the tunnel, Rockridge, and Temescal. Of the 33 projects, 19 include areas within RCPC's boundaries.

#### **Proposed Mitigations**

The proposed mitigations, which must stay within a budget of \$8 million, include bike lanes and sidewalks, traffic signals, and sound walls in the vicinity of Highway 24. Many of the proposed project designs illustrating the mitigations are conceptual at this point, with community input and more detailed designs needed for construction.

The Rockridge mitigation receiving the most audience interest was the Broadway/ Lawton intersection.

Residents described the hazardous crossing conditions at the intersection and expressed support for improvements. Over \$400,000 was proposed for the intersection by the agreement, with the final configuration to be decided in future public meetings.

Soundwalls on Highway 24 were also mentioned by many members of the public at the meeting. The proposed soundwallrelated project is not for actual construction but for studies needed to qualify each segment for state construction funding. Several speakers supported soundwalls as



a way to enhance the quality of local life. The health impacts of noise at the measured levels along Rockridge streets, particularly on young children, was noted. Aesthetics was a concern of some speakers, as was the cost, and doubts about their effectiveness. Further analysis and review of the mitigation projects, including petitions and public meetings, should be expected.

The city accepted written comments through November 22. RCPC submitted a comment period, the city will review the public comments, then determine the next steps to prepare a final list for Council approval.

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

Teen Specialist Librarian Susy Moorhead presented the latest plan for construction slated to start in April, 2011. The current computer area will become the "Teen Zone," which will be glassed off from the main reading room. Both quiet and noisy areas will be provided for the use of patrons aged 12-18, and both will be stocked with rugged, moveable furniture. The current DVD and CD area will become the new adult computer area, with DVDs and CDs moving to an expanded home in what is now the teen section.

Other library areas will remain as they are but with better lighting upstairs in the balcony, which will continue to function as the wi-fi area.

#### A Porta Potty for Hardy PARK IS THE BEST CHOICE **EDITOR:**

I am writing to make the case for the Porta Potty in Hardy Park. If there must be a restroom, a Porta Potty is the best choice for Hardy Park. Why? Most importantly, functionality:

- A Porta Potty cannot be stopped up and become unusable.
- A Porta Potty cannot be intentionally blocked to cause a messy nuisance.
- A Porta Potty does not need water service to be of service. It functions as the emergency stopping spot it is.
- If the Porta Potty were to be vandalized it can be repaired or replaced easily.

This is not the time to add to this part of Oakland's infrastructure creating a new maintenance project.

Oakland built a similar toilet at Bella Vista Park in 2005. I visited two times to see it in operation. On both occasions, it was locked and parents at the park told me it was always locked.

I thought the plan to build a permanent structure had been stopped, due to the cost of construction, but more importantly the cost to maintain. I was dismayed to read that construction was to begin by year's end.

Removing the Porta Potty and replacing it with a locked building serves no one. If we must prove this to ourselves, take the Porta Potty away for three months to simulate a locked restroom.

such as construction areas and special events.

**EDITOR:** Rather than being a mistake, a regular restroom at Frog Park has been part of the long-term plan and community priorities for years. A Porta Potty is never as hygienic a solution as a regular restroom, and is not the best choice for a long-term facility like a park. Porta Potties can be damaged so they are not usable (this has happened at Frog Park), and they can be difficult for ADA users, the elderly and small children. Porta Potties are best suited to short-term uses,

Public Works planner Denise Louie, responsible for the Bella Vista restroom project, noted that it was built at the request of the community and is on Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) property. A special agreement limits its use to only during events and programs supervised by Oakland Parks & Recreation, OUSD or Friends of Bella Vista Park. It was never intended to be open day and night. The Friends of Bella Vista Park community leader recently confirmed to Ms. Louie that they are "happy to have the restroom" and the community supports the limited hours for the restroom because of the special circumstances involved.

The sfgate.com article the writer cites refers to Mission Dolores Park, an intensivelyused park in San Francisco, which hosts large special events. Two restrooms were not sufficient for their large crowds. Frog Park cannot be used for such large events, so the comparison is not relevant.

Given that hundreds of people have signed petitions supporting a regular restroom at Frog Park, we believe this new facility responds to community wishes.

# The Gift That Keeps On Giving

was speaking recently with a friend about a new cookbook I had purchased. He looked at me quizzically and told me he no longer gets recipes from cookbooks. He uses various Internet sites to get all his cooking ideas. No more cookbooks for him.

As a collector of over 300 cookbooks, I found his comment somewhat disturbing. For me, cookbooks are not simply about recipes. I consider contemporary cookbooks as gastronomic literature. With the publication of Julia Child's "Mastering the Art of French Cooking" and Irma Rombauer's "The Joy of Cooking," American home cooks began collecting cookbooks. Last year, more than 1,000 cookbooks were published and 40 million copies were sold.

For dedicated home cooks, a good cookbook is a gift that keeps on giving. With the onset of the holiday season, I would like to offer four new cookbooks as gift suggestions. Perhaps your gift recipient will reward you with a meal prepared from one of the great recipes in these wonderful cookbooks.

First on my list is "The Essential New York Times Cookbook: Classic Recipes for a New Century" by Amanda Hesser. The "father" of the contemporary cookbook is Craig Claiborne. Claiborne was the New York Times food editor from 1957-1972. As New Yorkers, we were weaned on the weekly Craig Claiborne column that appeared in the Sunday edition of the Times' magazine section.

Products of the post-World War II diet of canned and frozen vegetables, we were introduced by Claiborne to international cuisine. It was Claiborne who encouraged home cooks to broaden their culinary horizons and introduced Americans to the food processor and the joys of authentic Chinese cuisine. We've been making Claiborne's mushroom pie recipe every Thanksgiving for over 40 years.

Hesser's new book brings together the Times' classic recipes from 1850 to the present. In her introduction, Hesser makes sure the reader knows The Essential NY Times

Cookbook is not an update of Claiborne's classic "New York Times Cookbook," but is a 150-year collection of recipes that appeared in the Times. It took Hesser over six years to test-cook each recipe and update older recipes with more contemporary measurements and serving sizes. The result is a cookbook for the ages.

"The Sunset Cookbook" is a celebration of the California/Western-states lifestyle. Artichokes, avocado, pesto, Mexican cuisine and, of course, gourmet grilling were introduced to a generation of post WW II "Sunset Magazine" readers. For generations, Sunset has been showing home cooks how to prepare the bounty of Western produce, beef, lamb, seafood, and poultry. "The Sunset Cookbook" is an homage to iconic Western dishes such as guacamole, cioppino, fish tacos, Dungeness crab, grilled tri-tip and barbequed oysters, to name but a few. It was not until I was in graduate school and met friends from California that I had my first taco with guacamole. The recipes and wonderful photographs in "The Sunset Cookbook" invite us to once again celebrate the joys of the California food lifestyle.

New from the Barefoot Contessa Ina Garten is "How Easy Is That?" My daughter and I are major Ina Garten groupies. "How Easy Is That?" is Garten's seventh cookbook in her series. This is not your typical three ingredients, three steps, 30-minute cookbook. The recipes are outstanding! The Barefoot Contessa offers preparations that

are easy to make but have the unique flavor Garten is known for. The stunning photographs and easy-to-follow recipes invite the reader to have friends over for dinner. Check out the French Mussel Bisque or the easy Provençal lamb as luxurious additions to your entertaining repertoire. She even has a recipe for the classic New York egg cream. The recipe calls for Fox's U-Bet Chocolate Syrup. What a treat! As with all of Garten's books, "How Easy Is That?" will instantly become the go-to cookbook when inviting guests to brunch or dinner.

My last suggestion is a cross between a cooking magazine and cookbook. "Canal House Cooking" is published three times a year by Christopher Hirsheimer and Melissa Hamilton. Each edition of "Canal House Cooking" is a masterpiece of culinary art.

Hamilton and Hirsheimer cook in their small rustic country cottage in Lambert-ville, New Jersey. Hirshheimer was one of the founders of "Saveur" magazine. Her photographs in each issue of "Canal House Cooking" are simply elegant. Hamilton was an executive chef and food editor at "Saveur." 
#### Pickled Carrots

# **Year-End Report: FROG Park Repairs, Restroom Construction**

by the FROG Park Committee

#### **Frog Park Renovations Continue**

FROG Park committee members have collaborated with city staff and Leathers and Associates, the original play area designers, to determine how best to repair drainage problems and wood rot at Hardy Park, and to remove invasive redwood roots in Redondo Park's play area.

#### Redondo Park Repair Update

The matted redwood roots have been removed. Volunteer leader Gordon Piper and his Weekend Training Academy worked tirelessly on November 13 and 14 to clear most of the redwood roots and fibar out of the Redondo play area. More volunteers worked on a subsequent rainy Saturday to complete the root removal. The community volunteers worked alongside FROG's incredible Oakland Public Works gardeners Luciano Cortes, Mohan Singh, and Theresa Kennedy. We thank them all for their work.

Next, city staff will repair areas of the structures, the drainage system will be restored, a root barrier installed, and the city will put in new fibar. Redondo should be open by mid-January. In the meantime, the play area is closed. Children should not be allowed to play on the gravel in the area.

FROG seeks a Certified Arborist to design and implement a redwood root

# Survey: FROG Park Users Express Facilities Preferences

New FROG Committee Member Carol Behr developed a survey to assess park users' preferences and feedback. Behr and other volunteers contacted park users near the Hardy play area. Others completed the survey online. Nearly 100 responses were received. Most responders were Rockridge residents. About 60 percent come to the park two to seven times or more a month, with about 20 percent coming eight or more times a month.

#### **Findings**

**Surfacing:** People preferred the fibar to options such as sand or

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
# Giving Thanks for Being a Little Cold





ing design and right of way management," told us he prefers 48 inches but said ADA requirements, Title 24, California and Oakland building codes had varying and overlapping requirements.

A second inspector and his supervisor are applying the most rigorous interpretation ("property to face of curb") of Oakland Municipal Code 12.04.070: "Grass and other obstructions: Every owner of real property in the city shall keep the entire sidewalk in front of such property, from curb to lot line, free and clear of all grass, weeds, rubbish, or other obstructions or materials which from any cause whatever shall have accumulated or may accumulate upon such sidewalk above the established grade of the same." Grass or leaves maybe, but does this include landscaping?

One person's blight is another's ambiance. The space between table and chairs and curb plantings at the Nomad Cafe on Shattuck are, on average, 21 inches. The fortnight lilies planted curbside at the Jane Brunner-sponsored new entrance to Bushrod Park overhang the sidewalk and constrict it to about 30 inches. All blight?

#### **A Complaint-Driven Process**

Calls to some Council offices revealed unhappiness with the ordinance. Neighbors and community activists see a pattern of grudge complaints and inspectors conducting fishing expeditions and costly re-inspections. A realtor we know routinely called in blight complaints about properties near houses he

was about to list.

#### **Green Concrete or Green?**

The message from CEDA affirms the safer course of concrete and cyclone fences to the detriment of landscaping, or, as the blight ordinance brochure puts it: "Keep your yards neat and tidy..." But landscaping is often calculated as 10 percent of a home's value. Some neighborhoods, like Rockridge, are defined by lush plantings and trees, the "community standard," maintained and underwritten by the property owner but benefitting all. Habitat supports vulnerable bees and birds, trees soak up carbon dioxide. Deciduous trees shade in summer and let sunlight through in winter, saving energy.

Councilmembers have embraced street trees and greening Oakland, but the rhetoric hasn't kept pace with the City's insatiable need for fees and fines; a permanent, mostly faceless bureaucracy that makes and enforces its own rules.

Now: Stop reading and rush outside to rake. Oakland handles 22,000 blight complaints a year. Your number may come up next.

tire swing under the play structure because it is unsafe for small children. The lower tire swing will remain. The train will be mostly rebuilt. Leathers and Associates said much of the wood rot was due to sand mixing into the fibar. Later, a new entrance added to the sand area will open directly onto the walkway instead of into the train area, reducing the chance of sand mixing with fibar. Lastly, the suspension bridge will be rebuilt off-site this spring. To help with this project (some carpentry skills would be helpful), please contact Howard Ferrier, hwferrier@sbcglobal.net.

#### **Local Merchant Support**

We are grateful to Economy Lumber Piedmont (formerly Piedmont Lumber) for procuring, at a substantial discount, the special synthetic wood for the repairs. They've provided materials at cost to FROG since 2001. College Avenue's Strahan

Insurance Services contributed \$500 toward the cost of the tot slide. We are grateful for both merchants' continued support.

#### **Restroom Update**

Park users have worked more than four years to get a functional restroom at the Hardy end of Frog Park. FROG committee member Mike McDonald and others gathered hundreds of signatures in support of a restroom, and worked with Councilmember Jane Brunner and her staff to secure funding. A recent survey of almost 100 park users showed that a regular restroom was the number one priority.

The new restroom will be located about where the Porta Potty now sits, utilizing existing sewer and water lines. FROG funded the Porta Potty for the past nine years – at a cost of about \$2,000 a year – as a part of the long-term construction plan. Restroom construction should begin later in December. The single, unisex restroom will be about 6 feet by 8 feet in size, with a sink, flush toilet, and solar panels for lighting. It will be locked at night. City staff expect construction will take about three months.


