# **How Old is Claremont Middle School, Really?**

Claremont Middle School's presence at the intersection of Birch Court and College Avenue dates back to the year 1918, according to documents obtained from the History Room at the Oakland Public Library. It was relocated just five blocks from its former location at the intersection of College and Claremont avenues where it was founded as a one-room schoolhouse in 1899.

At the time, it was called Claremont Grade School and was positioned at the entrance to the expanding neighborhood on the Berkeley-Oakland border. The name tells us a lot about the neighborhood back then, when Winifred and Raymond Perry famously purchased a substantial amount of property in the upscale Claremont district adjacent to Vernon Park, purchasing just over five acres of the Roselawn subdivision at the northeast end of the city of Oakland. At the time, this area was already well known for the Pagoda Hill Estate and Roselawn Park Estate, which were considered the largest and fanciest in Oakland.

Indeed, the Perrys' choice of location in 1910, now the site of St. Albert's Priory, to build their estate – Brookhurst – at the end of Birch Court (formerly called Pagoda Avenue) to constitute a country estate near the heart of a great city, reflects just how fine this neighborhood was and how the addition of Claremont Grade School at the opposite end of Birch Court would have been well-received by families moving into the community. In fact, enrollment was so

great that the lower grades were split off in the 1920s to form the Claremont School Annex on Chabot Road, later renamed Chabot Elementary School.

At some point Claremont Grade School became a junior high school. I could not find a date in the history room but when I moved to Birch Court in 1976, it was known as Claremont Junior High. It officially became a middle school in 1985 when a sixth grade was added and the ninth graders were sent to Oakland Technical High School. My oldest son was in that first sixth-grade class.

Today the sign on the side of Claremont Middle School states, "This school has been here since 1913." Unfortunately, the sign is celebrating the wrong year, as the school opened for its very first class in 1918 and, in fact, there is a photograph at the history room of the first class sitting in front of the gate that states: "Claremont Grade School, 1918."

I believe that, over time, the letter on the signage eroded and the 8 turned into a 3. As the mother of three children who attended Claremont Middle School in the 1980s and 1990s, I wholeheartedly support and celebrate the school and the excellent teachers my kids were fortunate to have.

I understand that the Claremont Middle School community is planning a centennial celebration. I would, however, like to suggest that they save the date for historical accuracy to celebrate this wonderful school, its dedicated teachers and its place in the history of this northeastern part of the city of Oakland.

*Editor's Note:* Ms. Kasdin's article was previously published in The Montclarion newspaper. Annual Public Works "Pothole Blitz" Will Blast Worst Offenders

# Report Your Potholes for City's 'Pothole Blitz'

Chortly after Susan Shawl's informal Opothole survey was published in the March issue of The Rockridge News, many of the pavement failures she documented were filled and paved, including the one on Claremont Avenue that measured a whopping 3 feet by 4 feet by 3 inches deep.

Coincidence? Possibly.

To be fair, an announcement from Oakland's Public Works Department states that changes in the weather bring an opportunity for longer-lasting pothole filling: "When the rains stop, Public Works crews try to catch up on potholes. For effective patching and repairs, the more permanent materials need warmer weather."

In fact, it turns out that every year in late April, "the city does a 'Pothole Blitz,'

filling thousands of potholes and repaving some of the worst sections," according to the announcement.

The city repair crews even build their repair list from information provided by citizens as alarmed as Susan Shawl was, asking residents "to provide the locations of some of the worst potholes."

As the Mayor noted in her statement above, the pothole blitz runs from April 29 until June 6. If you have a favorite – or particularly egregious - pothole, the city wants to know about it; or them, if you're aware of more than one....



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# **New Trees Spruce up Davita Dialysis Facility**

Scenic Street volunteers planted nine flowering sidewalk trees around the dilapidated Davita Dialysis facility on Claremont Avenue at Clifton Street last month, but ground-breaking on the company's own landscaping improvements – promised over a year ago – remains to be seen.

"The new trees will add badly needed greenery around the neglected property," says Peter Lund, founder of Scenic Streets, the local group coordinating the effort.

"Our goal is to improve the street view of this prominent property without inhibiting its business activities" he says. His group has added a total of 29 new sidewalk trees to the Rockridge-Temescal gateway in just the past year, and volunteers water them regularly.

Last month's planting was a true community effort that took months to arrange, Lund explained. Scenic Streets had first to negotiate permission from the property's landlord. Then-Councilmember

# **Bumper Crop of Poppies Not Just Nature's Doing**



Hundreds of orange poppies have brightened up the Claremont Avenue highway ramps this spring, but Mother Nature had a helping hand. Scenic Streets volunteers spread nearly two pounds of seeds last fall hoping for lots of color about now. The on-ramp near Hudson has put on a particularly good show in recent weeks.

"Even we were a bit surprised." says Lee Patterson, one of the volunteers. "Like many Californians, our state flower has a mind of its own, and we weren't sure what kind of germination rate to expect." He notes that the results could have been even stronger with just a bit more precipitation earlier this year.

The group also sowed Blue Lupine seeds that got off to a strong start but then perished due to lack of water in January. "Luckily, dozens of daffodil bulbs donated by Keep Oakland Beautiful helped fill in some gaps" says Patterson. "But we'll try the Lupine seeds again next year. They look terrific mixed in with the poppies."

The temporary spring flowers have added a splash of vibrant color to the hundreds of drought-tolerant shrubs and trees the group has planted since forming just two years ago. Neighbors with green thumbs are encouraged to volunteer one flexible hour a month at www.scenicstreets.org.



When you see foxtails, pull them out by the root, trying to get all the parts. Then put them into a plastic bag, tie it tightly so nothing can escape and put that bag into the trash, NOT the green bin. Every foxtail plant that is not pulled out will turn into many more foxtails next season. All the pets will thank you.

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# Eyes on Rockridge **Local Activist Listens and Builds Community**

ver the activist, Stuart Flashman didn't wait around for dating websites to be invented. Back in the early 80s he advertised for his future wife in the San Francisco Bay Guardian.

"I said I was a politically active, liberal guy with a friendly dog," Flashman tells me as we sit at the table in his sun-lit dining room. "I got about 50 responses. I started working through them. We - Jacqueline (Jacqui) Richter, a geriatrician who know works for Kaiser Permanente in Walnut Creek - just hit it off."

His was not false advertising. Politically active and liberal continue to ring true today. And I attest to the fact that their two dogs, Hestia and Roxie, are friendly.

As you may know, Flashman is often the public face of the Rockridge Community Planning Council (RCPC) since, as chairman of the Land Use Committee, he takes the lead at public meetings concerning proposed construction and expansions within the RCPC's borders.

But you might not know that the Boston native who practices environmental, land use and elections law also has a PhD in biochemistry and molecular biology from Harvard.

I first encountered Flashman in February at an RCPC Town Hall meeting that included the environmental impact report for Safeway's second project at Broadway and Pleasant Valley Avenue.

He was impressive, both for his in-depth knowledge of the project and his calm responses to passionate residents questioning whether the proposed Emeryville-style shopping center is even appropriate for Rockridge's southern border.

"He always listens to people with respect," says Annette Floystrup, who served on the board with Flashman. "He's adept at keeping meetings moving. He's pretty no-nonsense on the one hand, and yet he has a wonderful sense of humor."

Emeryville is actually where Flashman, in the mid-'80s, began honing his skills as an activist fighting corruption and poor planning.


While working as a senior research biologist at Stauffer Chemical Co. in Richmond and living in Emeryville, he was elected and later bounced from the Emeryville City Council, served on the Emeryville Planning Commission and founded and co-chaired the Emeryville Shoreline Committee.

After one heated meeting when a city official barked at him, "You're not a lawyer," Flashman got the idea to become one. So, when a company merger led to Flashman (and the rest of Stauffer Chemical Company's agricultural biotechnology research group) being laid off, he opted for law school rather than move to the Midwest, where agricultural biotech research had become centered.

"Having a law degree would be another tool in my tool belt," he says. And, "It actually was a pretty easy transition from biology to law."

"It was a very busy period," he vividly recalls: "I got elected to the East Bay Municipal Utility District [he was president in 1994]; I had to leave a class [at the New College of California School of Law] to take my wife to the hospital" for the birth of their first child.

That would be Sarah, now 23 who is

studying for a master's in social work at Smith College. Johanna, 17 and a junior at Bishop O'Dowd High School, was born after they moved to Rockridge in 1992. (He and Jacqui already frequented the Rockridge Café.)

Flashman knew that working in environmental law wasn't easy because he had a brother in the field. But, he decided: "I'll hang out a shingle and see what happens." After doing contract work for other attorneys, "I got a few cases. I won a few cases and what do you know, I had a practice. I've been doing it for 22 years."

He was appointed to the RCPC board to fill a vacancy in 2007 after the prodevelopment faction of the board lost the election and another pro-development person resigned. He rose to the position of chairman and is now chairman emeritus.

Rockridge citizens in the mid-1970s prescribed neighborhood commercial zoning that would be limited to three stories, Flashman says. "They were very perceptive." As a result, "Rockridge is more or less built out," he says. "We are basically a two-lane street. In Rockridge, it's not more people, it's more cars."

I asked him about potential conflict of

interest between his land use practice and community work. In the only instance, when the RCPC was involved in the Fourth Bore Coalition (FBC) litigation on the Caldecott Tunnel and Flashman served as the FBC attorney, he recused himself from RCPC board discussions related to the litigation.

In his role as land use committee chair, Flashman has been intimately involved in the proposed Safeway expansion discussions. He was one of the people to negotiate a compromise on the College Avenue Safeway where he says, demolition should start by fall and construction around the end of the year.

Currently, he also meets with both the city of Oakland and citizens on the Safeway shopping center at Broadway and Pleasant Valley Avenue. He doesn't think the big box stores that are proposed will affect College Avenue retail. "It's going to be a different kind of retail," he says.

But Flashman is concerned with neighborhood cut-through traffic, which "hasn't been properly addressed." He's optimistic that the city planner assigned to the project, who he says "is the best one they have," will come up with solutions.

His friends are happy that the hours, expertise and caring that Flashman has given on behalf of Rockridge are being written about.

"We got to know Stuart and Jacqui when our daughters were in Duck's Nest Preschool 18 years ago," says Charli Depner. "He's an activist in the very best sense, sharing his extensive knowledge and experience in an engaging way, meeting people where they are, listening and building community.

"When I despair that we will never save the world," says Depner, who works on children and family judicial branch programs, "I take heart that people like Stu will motivate us to make the present better."

Stu is just a great guy all around," adds Mitch Chyette, who does legal research and writing and is married to Depner. "He embodies the aphorism: think globally, act locally. He has a big heart and I greatly admire his dedication to our community."

from a Temescal merchant's group, he said.

Ideally, the trees would have been installed after Davita had completed its own landscaping upgrades to the property, such as replacing the ragged perimeter fencing. However those improvements remain bogged down in red tape, and Lund says the trees simply couldn't wait any longer.

Scenic Streets continues to enable Davita to begin its landscaping improvements. Beyond new perimeter fencing, a company spokesperson pledged in October 2011 to add more greenery to the property's northwest corner. Shortly thereafter, Scenic Streets provided bids from local contractors totaling just over \$20,000 for the entire project, but surprisingly little progress has been made by the \$7 billion corporation since. Davita operates over 1,800 dialysis treatment facilities nationwide including three in Oakland, said Lund.

Davita's landlord confirmed he is receptive to the proposed improvements and is awaiting formal documentation from the company's representatives. The paperwork should be the final hurdle, and Lund remains optimistic that the company will fulfill its promise this summer.


